Norway's Untold Stories: 1940-1945

Tuesday, June 13, 1:30-3:30 P.M.

Dr. Jan Hansen was 10 years old when the occupation of Norway by the Nazis began five long and frightening years from 1940-1945. Stories about insurgent actions, sabotage, heroism, and escapes have been told and retold. Even most Norwegians do not generally know stories about the deceit and tactics of Vidkun Quisling's National Sampling Party, about the horrors of the prisons, labor camps and POW camps. Also less well known are stories about "scorched earth" tactics, which devastated the land as the Nazis retreated from the Russian advance in Northern Norway. Dr. Hansen and his family immigrated to the U.S. after WWII when he was 14 years old. He attended St. Olaf College and became an economics professor at UW Eau Claire. He will focus on these untold stories.

Former U.S. Foreign Diplomat, Tom Hanson, will explore the latest U.S. foreign policy trends and challenges. Increasing populism, nuclear security issues, shifting alliances, increasing globalization and international trade may produce attitudinal changes from countries worldwide. Reactions toward shifting U.S. policies including “push back” will be discussed. Tom Hanson is a former U.S. Foreign Service Officer. He was posted in East Germany, France, Norway, Sweden and the Soviet Union and also participated in opening new embassies in Mongolia and Estonia. He currently serves as Diplomat in Residence at the University of Minnesota, Duluth. Wild and Free Rehabilitation Program

The Wild & Free Wildlife Rehabilitation Program is a non-profit organization that rescues injured and orphaned wild animals, treats them and attempts to release them back into the wild. It is run by a very dedicated group of volunteers who donate their time and money to help all the animals they receive. Approximately 500 animals are treated per year ranging from small songbirds to hawks, owls and eagles, small bunnies, fawns, fox, coyote, bears. Wild and Free is the only facility in the state of Minnesota licensed by the Minnesota DNR and the Fish & Wildlife Service to take in and treat bears?
